Jetter has a fun time advising the After-Care kids!

If you are interested in learning more about the After-Care program, here is some additional information Lisa Jetter gave me:

- The After-Care Program is run by the Catholic Charities, Diocese of Metuchen, Partners Program.

- Kids can attend After-Care upon dismissal of school (2:00) until 6 p.m.
- Costs: 5 days a week: \$260 per month – 4 days a week: \$225 per month – 3 days per week: \$185 per month – 2 days a week: \$132 per month. Drop-in cases for one are \$20 per day. Annual non-refundable registration fee is \$40 per family. There is a 10% discount for siblings.
- Contact: Parents can contact Partners Administrative office at (908) 329-2009 and ask for someone in the childcare division.
- Kids can come for just two, three or four days a week. The company tries to provide services that are conducive to the needs of all families served. There are also “one day drop- in” cases available.

"My favorite memory is carving statues out of clay in art class. One of my statues was picked to go in one of the art shows!"

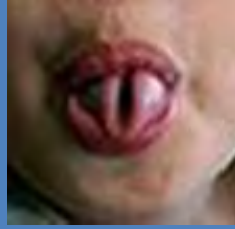
Miss Ressler:

A: "My wife was a 6th grade teacher and I have two children; my daughter, Taylor, is going to be 6 in June and my son, Jake, is going to be 4 in September."

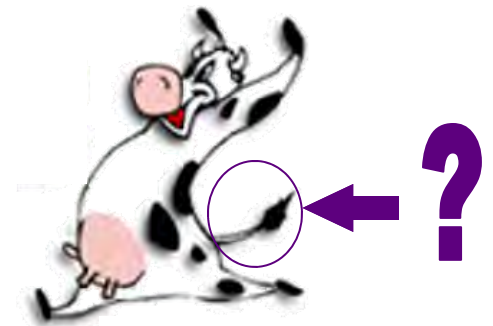
Q: Do you have any pets besides Philbert?

Pacific Law

My assignment was to interview my cousin who is a lawyer for the Federal Government in California. He replied to my emails very quickly and acted eager to answer the questions that I sent him.

Q: What kind of lawyer are you? Do you have a special area that you concentrate in?

A: "I am a criminal prosecutor. I work for the United States Department of Justice, so my job is to prosecute federal crimes. When someone is arrested by a federal agency (like the FBI or the Border Patrol) we take the case to court and present it to a jury."

Q: Do your cases often result in people going to jail?

A: "Yes, almost all of my cases result in people going to jail (if they are found guilty). I work in San Diego, California, near the border of Mexico, so a lot of my cases involve drug dealers who try to

smuggle drugs across the border in to the United States.

Depending on the amount and type of drugs involved, they can spend anywhere from 60 days to 10 years in prison."

Q: Why did you decide to become a lawyer?

A: "I think I decided to be a lawyer when I was in high school. I don't really remember though."

Q: How did you get your current job?

A: "I had to fill out a 20-page written application. Then, I had to do an interview with about 10 different people. They decided they liked me, so I got the job."

Q: Do you enjoy the work you do?

A: "Yes, I like it a lot."

Q: What types of jobs did you have before this one?

A: "Before this job, I worked for a Judge in San Diego as a law clerk. My job was to help the Judge by researching cases and writing opinions. Before that, I worked at a law firm in New York."

Q: Do you like living and working in California?

A: "Yes, it's a great place to live and work. The weather is always nice, and I've even learned how to surf!"

Q: What do you find the most interesting thing about your work?

A: "The most interesting part of the job is solving cases. Many times, we have cases where we need to find out who is guilty of a crime. We work with federal agents to interview witnesses, get search warrants, and try to get to the bottom of the crime. Then, we take all the evidence and prove to a jury who is guilty."

Q: What do you find the least interesting about your work?

A: "A lot of people plead guilty without taking their case to trial. It can be a little boring signing and processing all the guilty pleas."

Q: What advice do you have for people that might want to become lawyers?

A: "In law school and in the practice of law, we spend a lot of time reading and analyzing cases. You have to be a very good reader and writer to be a good lawyer, so I would work on those skills. I would also try to get comfortable giving speeches and speaking in front of people. Beyond that, I would just recommend working hard and making good grades in school."

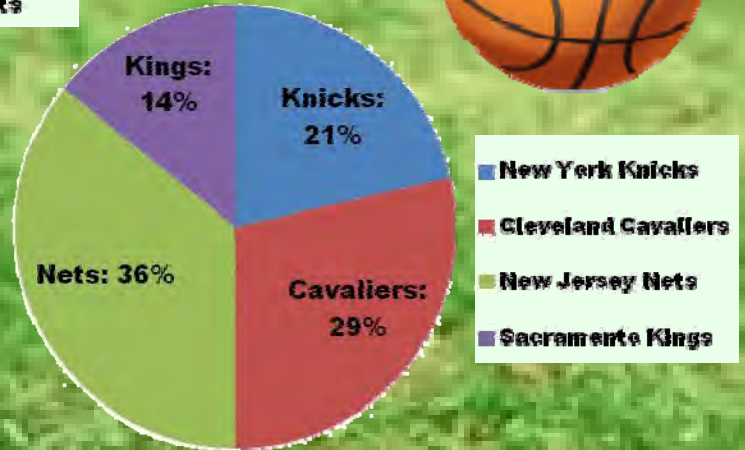

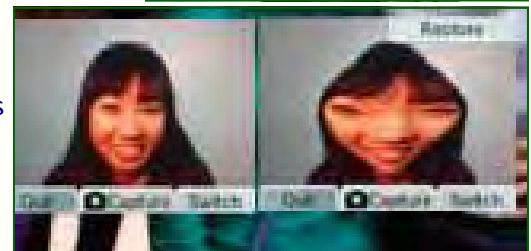
The New Nintendo DSi Review

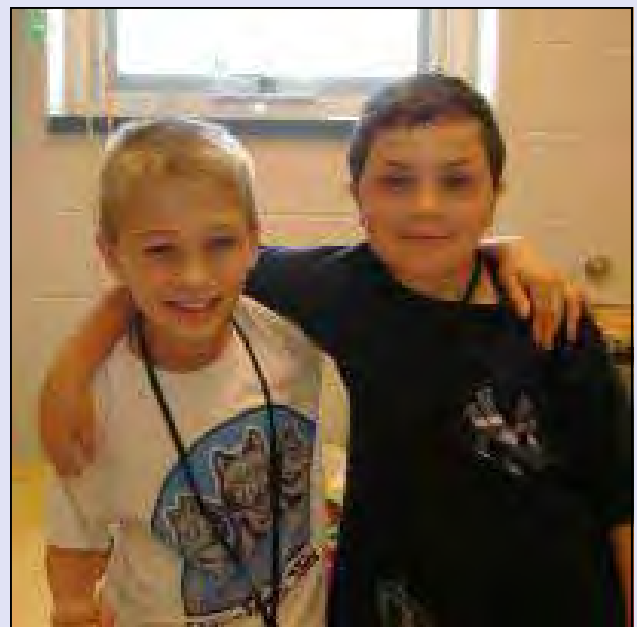


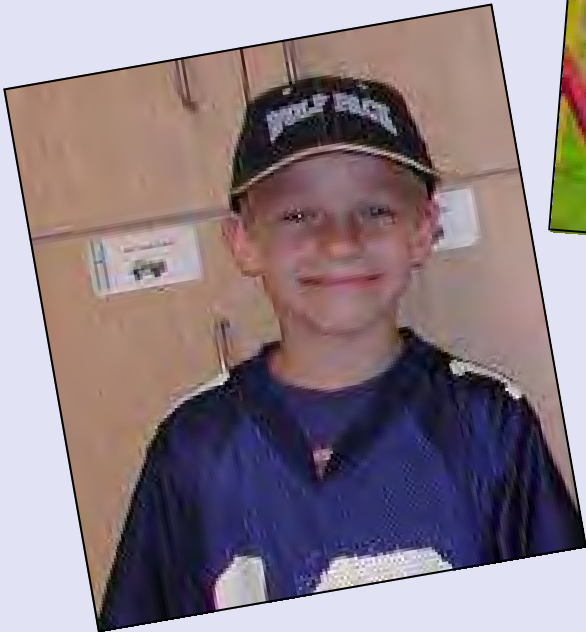
